We also have a number of possum traps people can borrow if they have a possum problem. I just advise they aren't for the timid.
- Again with Les, the dunes rehabilitation continues and there will be events later this planting season. _ Les will let the community know when this will occur. We are part of a larger collective of dune planting communities so the dates have to work with other beach areas many of whom have much greater coastal inundation than us. Please watch this space for event details.
- Sandra, our social messiah, has been busy with lots of community events. Coming up we have All Black games at the cafe, mid winter Christmas and the regular morning teas and Friday Community get together. There is more planned so watch out for our communications thru Gmail and Facebook.
- Chairman Rob has been working hard with the council and the community board to progress issues that affect our community. We have a number of works in progress or that have been progressed including dredging the lake which has been done, permanently fixing the bridge which is in progress as we
- speak, progressing the basketball half court proposal which will be reported separately, addressing the four wheel drive issue where we finally have got some engagement from the Forestry company (and we have a potential plan B if this doesn't work) and more. We have followed progress on the Council Annual Plan and considered the proposals relating to Local Water Done Well. We are just a small community but it's still important we follow and comment on what's important to us especially as it's Local Body election year
- Our Civil Defence team have been busy updating their emergency plan and also participating in a peninsular wide training exercise. All went well at our end apart from the communications with the 'mother ship' which will need to be addressed. Identifying these things is why we do training exercises. We do have a comprehensive plan which can be viewed on the ORCA website.

ORCA have decided that we wish to continue as an Incorporated Society so have drafted a new document to ensure we comply with the Department of Internal Affairs rules. It is proposed that this will be emailed to all members later in the year for adoption at the AGM. Unfortunately most off the new clauses are mandatory by law and while we can use alternative wording the principles of the clauses cannot change.
- With the winter months the Dotties team (and the birds) have been in rehab and planning mode with a big season ahead. There appear to be many more dogs around so it will be important once these protected birds start nesting that the beach rules are followed. The beach pest control work never stops and it's gratifying to see a number of stoats being trapped.
- We still have issues with people riding motorised bikes on the reserves and understand the rules are a little ambiguous as to the difference between an electric bike and a motorbike. Nobody wants to be a killjoy and the key thing is for us all to be careful and considerate.
- On an annoying note, some nice person or persons has stolen 3 of the Surf Club rescue tubes which are located at various points along the beach. It's just madness as they have no other practical use as they are specialised rescue equipment. If you know anything let Surf Club Chair Nick know or anyone on the ORCA Committee or if you see them stashed somewhere also let us know.

Please keep safe and warm as the weather at present is very unpredictable. Also keep an eye on your neighbours as these dark days and nights and scary world events can be tough to get through.
